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Sustainability Update

The 2022 FOOD WASTE Recycling Program and YOU!

The California Senate passed a bill to **improve air quality and reduce greenhouse gas emissions**. CalRecycle reports that landfilled organic waste (including green waste and food waste) decomposes in landfills and generates greenhouse gases contributing to global climate change. Starting in 2022, all California residents may be required to participate in a Food Waste Recycling Program in order to comply with **Senate Bill 1383**.

Senate Bill 1383 requires a **75% reduction in organic waste disposal statewide by 2025**.

All residences and commercial businesses may be required to participate in this program to **recycle organic waste, including green waste and food waste**.

Cleaning Up Stormwater Runoff

What is stormwater runoff? It is the rain and melting snow that flows off streets, rooftops, lawns, and farmland. The flowing water carries salt, sand, soil, pesticides, fertilizers, leaves and grass clippings, oil, litter, and many other pollutants into nearby waterways. Since these pollutants are washed off a wide area and cannot be traced to a single source, they are called nonpoint source or runoff pollutants.

Each of us contributes to stormwater pollution and each of us can help stop it. Here are some ways you can help:

- ✓ Keep pesticides, oil, leaves and other pollutants off streets and out of storm drains.
- ✓ Divert roof water to lawns or gardens where it can safely soak in.
- ✓ Clean up pet waste – place in a bag and into your trash barrel.
- ✓ Keep cars tuned up and repair leaks – or use alternative transportation, walk, bike or take the bus.

It's Cool to Reuse for School

With the school year upon us, reusing materials is good for your wallet and the environment. Here are a few ways to reuse and collect items throughout the year.

School Supplies: Many students leave school supplies in their lockers at the end of the year or dispose of them at home. Instead of throwing these items away, regularly collect them for a community sale or donation drive. Some of these materials can be very useful to others.

Books: Instead of tossing your old books, consider establishing a book exchange in your school or community. You may also consider donating used books to a library, nursing home, or other organization that might want them.

Art Supplies: Organize a collection of art supplies to use at school, to exchange among interested students, or to donate to a needy organization such as a homeless shelter for families and children.

Sports Equipment: You can collect unwanted or unused sports equipment to exchange within a school, for reuse in different schools, or to raise money for charities.

Special Occasion Items: Consider an annual prom dress exchange or donation drive. Collect once-worn dresses and donate them to interested schools and organizations.

RECYCLE IT!

Recycle your leftover liquid cooking oil to avoid the hassle of dealing with clogged pipes and other sewer problems.

- Step 1** Cool oil to a safe temperature & filter to remove food particles.
- Step 2** Pour oil into a jar or plastic container with a tight fitting lid.
- Step 3** Take the oil to your nearest toxic waste collection center.

Appliance Bulky Item Pick Up IMPORTANT INFORMATION

The proper way to dispose of refrigerators and certain appliances involves either taping the door shut or completely removing the door or the latching mechanism before placing the bulky item out for pick up.

Before disposing of large appliances, tape doors or remove doors and/or hinges on all large appliances to prevent entrance and entrapment by small children.

Clean the Green

Adhering to the green waste program requirements by placing the proper material in your container is critical to creating a long-term sustainable solution for green waste.

Acceptable Green Waste Materials (put in your green waste barrel)

- Brush
- Cactus
- Grass clippings
- Leaves
- Prunings
- Shrub trimmings
- Tree trimmings
- Twigs & small branches
- Weeds



Non-Acceptable Materials (put in your trash barrel)

- Birds of Paradise
- Food waste
- Glass
- Household trash
- Palm fronds
- Pet waste
- Plastics
